I Cried out to the Lord Many a time:

When I went through my divorce, I went in a tail

spin and it shattered me completely in thousands of pieces. For years I could not see the light; I could not fight my way out of that black hole of depression, I was stuck... believe



me I cried out to the Lord many times. But it was **not until I started to** <u>forgive</u>, repent and apologize for holding a grudge not only against people but also against the Lord, that things changed.

Instead, I began thanking the Lord for counting me worthy to give me such a big test to see what I was made of. That is when he started putting me back together slowly, piece by piece, so he could work on changing my self-righteous, willful character. Eventually I became thankful for him lovingly glueing me back together; yet, I'm far from having attained.

One scripture that helped and pulled me through was Deuteronomy 8:2, 'You shall remember all the way that the Lord your God led you these forty years in the wilderness, **to humble you, and test you, to know what was in your heart**, whether you would

keep his commandments, or no.' If I grumble and God knows I can, I am lost. Molehills become mountains, incidents disasters,



and I become unbearable for myself and others.

I think I'm learning that if I'm thankful for everything in my life, for the positive but also for the negative incidents and say, '**Thank you for this test. Lord, I honestly mean it and am not being sarcastic'**, then it doesn't affect me half as much. (1Thess.5:18)

Her Newborn had Died

A female pastor talked to me about her newborn that had just died and she was utterly devastated, wondering if God was still love or even listening. Because I went through the wringer myself, I was able to <u>hear from the Lord</u> for her and comfort her.

It was clear that with his short lifespan the baby had

fulfilled his mission; it was to bring his mother the most beautiful gift that she would never forget. The Lord had used the newborn to place his anchor deep into the mother's heart, so that she would know at all times that she was one of the Lord's Queens and that the Lord placed this hook into her soul to strengthen their direct bond and line with each other. It radically changed her outlook about the baby's death; from a disastrous calamity to a precious gift from her King, which she then accepted gracefully with tears flowing and thanksgiving. 'The Lord is close to them that have a broken heart and saves those with a soft contrite spirit.' (Psalms 34:18)

Am I the Only one that's Tested like this?

Sometimes the Lord will test our tenacity to see if we stay faithful to him. People have lost children throughout the ages; believers and non-believers. But not all the parents and their pastors

have turned bitter against God. It broke them that is for sure, but from those



broken pieces the Lord could rebuild their character: richer, softer and more understanding of others.

Why don't you Curse God, and Die?

If you download a Bible for your CP or laptop, you



find the life story of Job. He was a wise, rich, generous man and Satan was allowed to test him. He lost his children then his cattle and his houses. To top it off Job got boils all over his body from head to toe. He scraped himself with a broken

piece of ceramic; and sat down in the ashes of his burned property. If that was not enough his wife told him, **'Do you still retain your integrity? Curse God, and die.**' But Job said to her, 'You speak as one of the foolish women... What? **Shall we receive good at the hand of God, and not receive evil?**' ¹

Talk about disasters; Job lost everything, except his body and that completely covered in boils.

Job had three "friends": Eliphas, Bildad and Zophar who came to see him. They tell him, that suffering is the result of sin, but Job is not impressed and says, 'No doubt but you are the people, and wisdom shall die with you... O that you would altogether be quiet and it should be your wisdom... Though God slays me, yet will I trust in him:'² His friends give more counsel, but Job is a tough cookie and says, 'I have heard it before; miserable comforters you are... But God knows: when he has tried me, I shall come forth as gold... for God is softening my heart...'³ 'As God lives... who has vexed my soul; as long as I can breathe... my lips shall not speak wickedness, nor my tongue utter deceit.'⁴

Job says, 'Look, I was eyes to the blind, and feet to the lame. I was a father to the poor... Unto me men gave ear, waited, and kept silence at my counsel. ⁵ But now... God hath cast me into the mire...' ⁶

Then Elihu a Young Man who was listening to all this, speaks to Job. ⁷ 'I am young, and you are very old; therefore, I was afraid to give you my opinion. I have heard your words, saying: 'I am clean without transgression, I am innocent; neither is iniquity in me. See, God has it in for me, he counts me for his enemy ⁸... You speak a lot against God. **Do you think that's right, that you said, my righteousness is more than God's?** ⁹ Please listen, O Job: stand still, and <u>consider the wondrous works of God</u>.' ¹⁰

It looks like Elihu struck a Chord in Job's Heart to finally listen to the Lord. After this the LORD started speaking and answered Job out of the whirlwind... 'Now gird up your loins like a man; (Stop whining) Where were you when I laid the foundations of the

earth? Explain it, if you are that good and smart. Can you send lightning? ¹¹ Have you given the horse its strength? Does the hawk fly by your wisdom?' ¹²



Then Job said, 'Look, I am despicable; I will put my hand over my mouth.' The Lord answered... 'Will you condemn me, so that you may be righteous?' ¹³

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And Job said... 'I uttered that I understood not... I abhor myself, and repent in dust and ashes.' ¹⁴

This Acknowledgement was the key Turning Point.

The Lord told Job to pray for his three friends, probably so he wouldn't be bitter against them. And when he prayed for his friends, the Lord turned Job's trouble around, and **he gave Job twice of what he had before**... and blessed the latter end of Job more than his beginning with double the number of sheep, camels, oxen and she asses. He also had seven sons and three extremely beautiful daughters. After this Job lived 140 years and lived to see his great-great-grandchildren. Job died, being full of days.¹⁵ (Job lived shortly after the flood -2501 BC - as after <u>the flood</u> people's lives started slowly lessening; i.e. Abraham was 175 when he died @2016 BC)

The Bible is full of people's Accounts that hung on:

Naomi and family left Israel because of a drought; her husband and her two sons died. She went back to her hometown a broken woman. Only Ruth one of her daughters-in-law stuck to her like glue. However, Naomi hung on and did not curse God, in turn the Lord inspired Naomi to matchmake Ruth, who became the great-grandmother of king David.

Just like we Can't see any Rhyme or Reason in the back side of an Embroidered cloth. But if we could see the other side then we would see a beautiful tapestry that the Lord is weaving in our lives.

The Lord is so fond of each individual and **he wants to build our character** so that we can experience life in the fullest way possible. With the result that the overwhelming waves of our temporary difficulties and disasters will **no longer drown us**, but that we



will thrill with the joy of being able to ride them on the surfboard that he gives us, if we'll <u>thank him for</u> <u>whatever he brings our way</u>. But we can also curse him. God has given us that freedom of choice: to bless or curse, to reach out or turn our back to him. Those decisions are <u>our prerogative</u>. **Yet, if we can**

thank him for the storms of life, they will no longer be able to blow us to pieces, but instead will carry us up, as the eagles soar high on the opposing winds... All these positive character

trades, <u>God</u> knew, we could not acquire on our own. That's why **we have his word**, and why **Jesus came**, **to show us** how to live, to <u>love</u>, to forgive, to <u>heal</u>, to hold on through 'shuck' and not give up.

Still, I'd like to Ask God a Thing or two:

'God, do you have any idea how it feels: To be <u>a refugee child</u> fleeing from insane killings? To go <u>without food</u> for more than a month? To be a rough-sleeper and be <u>homeless</u>? To be a freedom fighter <u>betrayed</u> by a close friend? To be <u>different so they spit and punch</u> in your face? To be a <u>black slave and whipped</u> mercilessly? To <u>be framed</u> for one of the cruellest, six hour long agonizing death sentences, while you only helped people and spoke the truth? <u>Please answer me!</u>'

'I gave my <u>one only Son</u>, who was my embodiment in human form and he went through all this to show you <u>our true character</u>... **We know what pain is.**'

Though Jesus is God, he was also <u>100% human</u> and could've given up many times but he held on, till his mission was fulfilled so we could be <u>saved from ruin</u>. <u>His life for ours, to show he values our life more</u> than his own, no matter how low we've fallen...
